


#### TOTAL BIRTHS IN OUR 13 WESD ZIP CODES.

The region is aging: An aging population combined with fewer births reshaped the region's population between 2010 and 2023.



Notice the large reduction in youth under the age of 14 years old. We have been drastically losing young children in our county for the past 13-15 years. This has greatly affected the number of students within the WESD boundary.

Figure 3: MAG Region Age Distribution Source: U.S. Census Bureau, American Community Survey 1-year Estimates


# INCOME HASN'T KEPT UP WITH HIGHER COSTS TO AFFORD BUYING A HOME.



The housing market is shaped partly by a combination of rising sales prices, higher interest rates, and the financial situations of buyers. As home prices have risen and interest rates increased, many buyers find it difficult to afford a home. The average age of home buyers has increased from 43 years old in 2010 to 50 years old in 2024.

**50**years Median Age of Home Buyers

Since 2021, the household income needed to afford a median-priced home has been much higher than the median household income.



Rising mortgage rates and high prices have slowed home sales in the region.



When young couples are struggling to have enough money to afford the basic necessities of living (Food, transportation, clothing, utilities, and a place to live) They tend to put off things like having children, getting a pet, taking vacations and other big ticket costs.
